

Accessing the NDIS for people with disability in NSW

Fact sheet

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People who currently receive specialist disability supports through the NSW Government or a service provider funded by the NSW Government will move to the NDIS as it rolls out.

Current supports will continue until a person has moved to the Scheme and their NDIS plan is in place.

People who do not currently receive NSW funded disability support will have the opportunity to access the scheme when it starts in their local area, if they are in immediate need of assistance, and do not currently have support.


How and when people with disability access the NDIS will depend on the type of support they receive now and where they live

The NDIS rolls out across NSW between 1 July 2016 and 30 June 2018.

From 1 July 2016, people living in Hunter New England, Southern NSW, Central Coast, Northern Sydney, South Western Sydney, Western Sydney and Nepean Blue Mountains will be able to access the NDIS.

From 1 July 2017, the NDIS will be in place across the rest of NSW, and people living in Northern NSW, Mid North Coast, Sydney, South Eastern Sydney, Illawarra Shoalhaven, Murrumbidgee, Western NSW and Far West NSW will be able to access the NDIS.

People living in large and small residential centres and group homes and people accessing hostels, attendant care, in-home support or alternative family placement

These people do not need to apply for access to the NDIS. They will be contacted by the National Disability Insurance Agency (NDIA) when it is their turn to access the NDIS. People who currently access these supports living in year 1 districts will move to the NDIS first, between 1 July and September 2016.

How will my disability accommodation be funded under the NDIS?

The National Disability Insurance Agency will support you to develop a plan and identify reasonable and necessary supports you need, including your accommodation supports. For some people, this will include funding for integrated accommodation and supports.

You can decide which provider you would like to use to provide these supports.

You will be required to make a contribution towards your accommodation costs, as is currently the case. For example, your contribution may cover the cost of food and utilities. How much you will need to contribute will depend on your individual circumstances.

Who will provide my supported accommodation under NDIS?

Under the NDIS, the New South Wales Government will no longer provide any specialist disability supports, including specialist disability accommodation.

These supports will be operated by the non-government sector, which already provides a majority of specialist disability accommodation. You will have the flexibility to choose who provides your accommodation.

What is specialist disability housing?

The term specialist disability housing refers to a number of different accommodation types which have been developed to meet the particular needs of people with disability. Specialist disability housing includes group homes, large residential centres and clusters of village-based accommodation.

Commonwealth, State and Territory Governments have agreed to work with the NDIA to develop and test new accommodation options. This work will inform how accommodation support is provided in the NDIS in the future.

Am I able to change my accommodation arrangements under the NDIS?

If you are an NDIS participant, you can work with the NDIA if you want to change your accommodation arrangements.

People who attend day, recreation and life skills programs as well as people who received support from therapy, early or behaviour intervention programs or use case management services

These people do not need to apply for access to the NDIS. They will be contacted by the NDIA when it is their turn to access the NDIS. Most people who currently access these supports living in year 1 districts are likely to move to the NDIS between 1 July and December 2016.

People accessing centre-based and flexible respite services

These people do not need to apply for access to the NDIS. They will be contacted by the NDIA when it is their turn to access the NDIS.

Most people who currently access these supports living in year 1 districts are likely to move to the NDIS from 1 January 2016.

People accessing personal care assistance, personal care, meal services, home modifications and transport services

People who currently access these supports need to apply for access to the NDIS. They will need to provide evidence of their disability as part of their NDIS access request. Information about providing evidence of disability can be found on the national NDIS website www.ndis.gov.au.

These people will be contacted throughout the year by the NDIA to apply, so they do not need to contact the NDIA directly. If deemed eligible for the NDIS, most of these people living in year 1 areas will move to the NDIS from January 2016.
